

### <u>NEW Executive Order N-5-23: Governor Newsom Eases Drought Restrictions</u>

The new EO rolls back some drought emergency provisions that are no longer needed due to current water conditions, while maintaining other measures that support regions and communities still facing water supply challenges, and that continue building up long-term water resilience. While recent storms have helped ease drought impacts, regions and communities across the state continue to experience water supply shortages. The order is intended to be responsive to current conditions while preserving smart water measure amid climate-driven weather whiplash. The EO terminates portions of prior drought orders issued by the Governor, including paragraph 7 of the <u>April 21</u>, <u>2021 State of Emergency Proclamation</u> that directed the State Water Board to consider adopting emergency regulation for the Russian River watershed. A Lyris notice is expected this week providing more detail Key Point: SWRCB will not be re-adopting Russian River emergency regulations in 2023.

### California Stream Gaging Prioritization Plan is Now Available

SB 19 Stream Gaging Plan | California State Water Resources Control Board An interactive geospatial tool and digital files are also available to help explore the Plan's recommendations.

Senate Bill No. 19 (SB 19) (Statutes of 2019, Chapter 361, Dodd) enacts Water Code section 144, which directs the Department of Water Resources (DWR) and the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) to develop a plan to address gaging information gaps through the deployment of a network of prioritized stream gages in consultation with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), Department of Conservation (DOC), the Central Valley Flood Protection Board (Flood Board), and interested stakeholders. The stream gaging plan identifies significant gaps in the stream gaging network to meet the wide variety of water management needs, which are increasingly important in the face of a changing climate. 




### Lake Mendocino Storage






## Lake Pillsbury Storage and Target Storage Scenarios




